We'll appreciate any good thoughts and support you can send our way on May 15th & 16th as we compete against the best K9 Nose Work teams in the nation to hopefully qualify for competition in the finals on May 17th.

P.S. A big Thank You to Valley Hills Obedience Club since they held a K9 Nose Work demo at a club meeting several years ago which I found fascinating. That is when our interest in K9 Nose Work began.

May is Dog Cancer Awareness Month

May is dog Cancer Awareness Month. There are so many good organizations working towards a cure for cancer in dogs. As many of you know one of our own VHOC members Terry Simons has a non-profit organization—CLEAR—Canine Lymphoma Education Awareness and Research. According to the CLEAR website (<http://clearcaninecancer.com/>) Lymphoma is one of the most treatable cancers if caught early. There are some breeds that are more prone to cancers, such as the Golden Retriever, but all dogs can have cancer, especially as they grow older and the cells don't replicate as rapidly or correctly. In many ways no different than in humans, where pesticides, herbicides and second hand smoke, can trigger cancer growth.

Terry has several events throughout the year to raise funds for CLEAR. CLEAR is also promoting the recognition of Canine Cancer with the award winning movie—“My Friend: Changing the Journey”.

Because Canine Lymphoma can be present in any of the dogs tissues it is very hard to diagnose, here are some of the Symptoms of Canine Lymphoma:

1. Swollen lymph nodes. The most common place is under the dogs jaw.
2. Lack of appetite
3. Fever
4. Weight loss
5. Vomiting and/or diarrhea
6. Sores that do not heal
7. Skin lumps
8. Lethargy
9. Excessive drinking
10. Noticeable change in personality.



If you notice anything strange or different in your dogs physical appearance or his personality please have your dog checked out by your Vet.

April 24, 2015 AKC Adds New “Urban CGC” Title To Popular Canine Good Citizen® Program

New York, NY – Giving responsible owners a whole new level of achievement for their dogs, the American Kennel Club (AKC) announced today the launch of “AKC Urban CGC” to the Canine Good Citizen (CGC) training program. The new title focuses on city-dwelling dogs and the special skills they require.

Since 1989, more than 700,000 dogs and their owners have been recognized by the CGC program, which rewards the dogs’ good manners at home and in the community.



As with CGC, AKC Urban CGC requires a [10-step test of skills](#) that dogs must pass to earn the official AKC Urban CGC title. AKC Urban CGC skills dogs must possess include:

- Exits/enters doorways (of dog friendly buildings) with no pulling
- Walks through a crowd on a busy urban sidewalk
- Reacts appropriately to city distractions (horns, sirens, etc.)
- Waits on leash, crosses street under control
- Ignores food and food containers on sidewalk
- Person approaches on sidewalk and pets dog
- 3-minute down-stay in lobby of dog friendly building
- Safely negotiates stairs and elevators
- Housetrained
- Enters, exits, rides dog-friendly transportation (car, subway in a carry bag, cab)

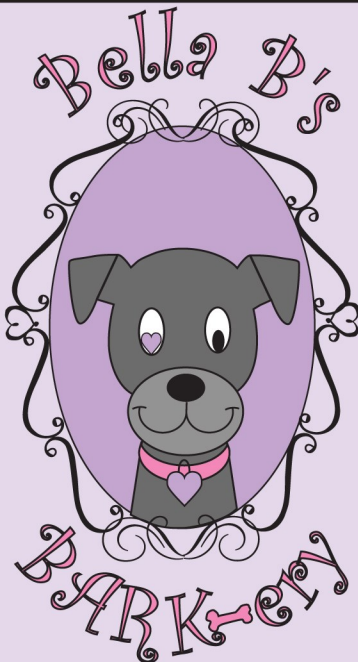
“City dogs require a very special set of skills, including waiting to cross a street, ignoring food tossed on a sidewalk, behaving in building lobbies and riding elevators,” said Mary Burch, Ph.D., Director of the Canine Good Citizen program. “Urban CGC reinforces practical, everyday skills for the millions of dogs living in urban areas today, creating safer, more responsible communities.”

To be eligible for the AKC Urban CGC title, dogs must have a CGC certificate or title on record at AKC and must have an AKC number (AKC registration number, PAL number, or AKC Canine Partners number). Dogs passing the AKC Urban Dog test will earn the “CGCU” title.

With the introduction of AKC Urban CGC, the AKC's CGC program now provides a variety of training options for dog owners and their dogs. Beginning with AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy, progressing to Canine Good Citizen, AKC Community Canine and now AKC Urban CGC, the CGC program trains dogs through all stages of life and in all settings to be well-behaved in society.

If you want to practice or learn the Novice, Open and/or Utility competition obedience exercises, come on out Tuesdays, 7:45 to 8:45 and join my class. It is a lot of fun and a great way to improve on all the obedience exercises. Please contact Laurie Burnam for more information - bellaluna@pacbell.net

First half of class:

1. Group heeling
2. Figure 8's
3. Sit for exam
4. Stand for exam
5. Moving stand for exam
6. Signals up close and distance
7. Recalls through handlers and dogs on leash for distractions
8. Drops in heel position
9. Drops with handler walking 4 steps past dog
10. Full drop on recalls
11. Fronts, straight on and at an angle
12. Finishes, left and right
13. Stationary attention at heel position with distractions
14. Heel through toys and food dishes
15. Catch up heeling with left and right turns
16. Circle/line recall with 2 or more at a time for distractions, if dogs are ok
17. PVC box work

Second half of class or last 20 minutes:

1. Group sits and downs
2. Dumbbell work, hold, take, retrieve on flat and jump
3. Jumps for open and utility exercises, broad, high and bar
4. Glove retrieves and all it's parts
5. Article work and all it's steps
6. Go outs and directed jumping

Each person can rotate stations or we work as a group on a single exercise. These exercises all depend on who is enrolled in the class and their level of training.

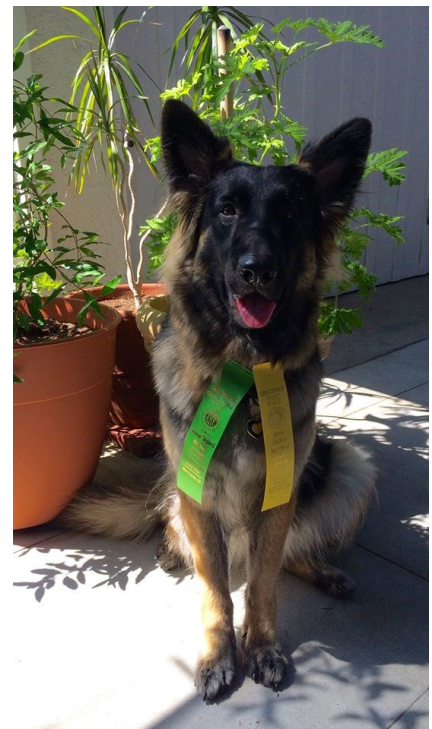

What is CARDA?

Area Search - Trailing - Cadaver - Water - Avalanche - Disaster

The California Rescue Dog Association, Inc. (CARDA) is a group of volunteers with specially trained dogs dedicated to assisting in the search for missing persons. CARDA teams are available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to respond to local, state, and federal law enforcement as well as other public service agency requests.

Established in 1976 and the largest search dog group in the nation, CARDA and its standards serve as a model for other search dog teams. CARDA is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization and has **120 currently certified dog teams** spread throughout the state.

In addition to mission-ready dog teams, there are also 113 active members without a currently certified dog, 86 apprentices working towards mission-ready status, 22 pre-apprentice members, and 26 support members.

CARDA search teams have **participated in thousands of searches** over the years and have **saved the taxpayers millions of dollars** through the use of volunteer resources. CARDA **members incur all costs** including mileage, equipment, pagers, and dog expenses. CARDA provides a radio to each mission-ready team member for field use. Many CARDA members take time off work to participate in searches and training, drive thousands of miles a year, and spend 50 to 100 hours per month for training and searches. CARDA teams participate in 200 to 400 searches annually.

At any given time, CARDA, the oldest and largest all-volunteer Not-For-Profit canine Search and Rescue organization in the nation has more than 150 certified dog and handler teams ready to deploy in search of the lost and missing. Providing services to local law enforcement, community service organizations, the National Forest Service and FEMA, CARDA members deploy on almost 400 searches annually and all of this at no cost to the public!

CARDA—FUND RAISER

Since its inception in 1976, CARDA K-9 search teams have participated in thousands of searches and saved the taxpayers of California millions of dollars through the use of this unique voluntary community resource. CARDA members personally absorb nearly every cost associated with their work: the dog, dog food, routine and emergency veterinary care, equipment, gas, vehicle maintenance, outside training, and time lost from work.

With an all-volunteer staff, every dollar raised goes directly to helping the organization continue its life saving work. The organization is planning to use the monies raised to cover emergency medical bills for dogs injured in the line of duty. With the amount of time and training it takes to bring a dog and handler to Mission-Ready status, each certified team is an extremely valuable resource. Ensuring every dog has access to the best and most comprehensive medical treatment available helps assure dogs remain healthy, active and available to work when the call comes in. Funds will also be dispersed to help partially cover handler deployment expenses. CARDA is a 501c3 Not-For-Profit so any donations made to CARDA will be tax deductible.

Thank you to Allison Pobirs for sending out this information on the VHOC Yahoo Group email. Just in case there are some folks not on the Yahoo list, this sounds like a interesting and informative book to read.

Chaser: Unlocking the Genius of the Dog Who Knows a Thousand Words ***A New York Times Bestseller***

The amazing story of a very smart Border collie who is redefining animal intelligence.

Chaser has a way with words. She knows over a thousand of them—more than any other animal of any species except humans. In addition to common nouns like house, ball, and tree, she has memorized the names of more than one thousand toys and can retrieve any of them on command. Based on that learning, she and her owner and trainer, retired psychologist John Pilley, have moved on to further impressive feats, demonstrating her ability to understand sentences with multiple elements of grammar and to learn new behaviors by imitation.

John's ingenuity and tenacity as a researcher are as impressive as Chaser's accomplishments. His groundbreaking approach has opened the door to a new understanding of animal intelligence, one that requires us to reconsider what actually goes on in a dog's mind. Chaser's achievements reveal her use of deductive reasoning and complex problem-solving skills to address novel challenges.

Yet astonishingly, Chaser isn't unique. John's training methods can be adopted by any dog lover. Through the poignant story of how he trained Chaser, raised her as a member of the Pilley family, and proved her abilities to the scientific community, he reveals the positive impact of incorporating learning into play and more effectively channeling a dog's natural drives.

John's work with Chaser offers a fresh perspective on what's possible in the relationship between a dog and a human. His story points us toward a new way of relating to our canine companions that takes into account our evolving understanding of the way animals and humans learn

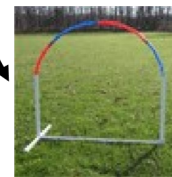

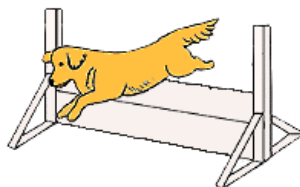
